Using a map of the world and pictures of key philosophers, plot the development of Philosophy from Plato to the modern day.	Ask 10 peers or family members their views on at least 3 'Ultimate Questions' ( <i>google ultimate questions for ideas</i> ) and record their answers.	Write a newspaper article outlining why philosophical study is still relevant in the modern world.
Create a timeline of the history of Philosophy from Plato to the modern day.	<del>Write a letter to your Philosophy teachers (Mrs. Lowe and Miss. Mehrban), explaining your decision to take Philosophy A Level.</del>	Research an <i>a priori</i> argument of your choice, and outline the sequence of the argument and explain the strengths of it as a logical argument.
Choose any philosopher and write an essay explaining their argument and your evaluation of it – what are its strengths and weaknesses?	Create a podcast explaining briefly the origins of Philosophy, including Plato, Aristotle, Aquinas, Augustine and Descartes.	Create a model that explains/represents what Philosophy is and its merits.
