What will my child be expected to know for the A-LEVEL exam? The specification at a glance is below, however more detailed subject specifications are available at: https://www.aqa.org.uk/subjects/psychology/as-and-a-level

A-Level Psychology consists of 3 examinations or 2 hours each. Each paper is out of 96 marks and each section is worth 24 marks, with the exception of research methods which is worth 48 marks. Research methods can also be assessed within any of the other topics.

- Purchase the textbook these are not available through school but are
 available online. We recommend the AQA PSYCHOLOGY FOR A LEVEL by Clara
 Flanagan (green and pink haired girl).
- Attend timetabled revision sessions: These are run in WG16 See timetables on classroom doors. (Thursdays)
- Learn key terms for each topic/key studies create flashcards with a key term on one side, the definition on the other.
- Create a 'Knowledge Board' for each topic this could include key information, terms, studies and theories as well as evaluation.
- Make use of the resources uploaded to Show My Homework

What could they do ensure they know how to 'apply' this information?

- Plan and writing exam questions on a regular basis (especially 16 mark and applied questions).
- Create a 'success criteria' for each type of question (AO1, AO2 and AO3).
- Utilise the **past papers** from the AQA website and use the mark schemes to self-assess your own work.
