

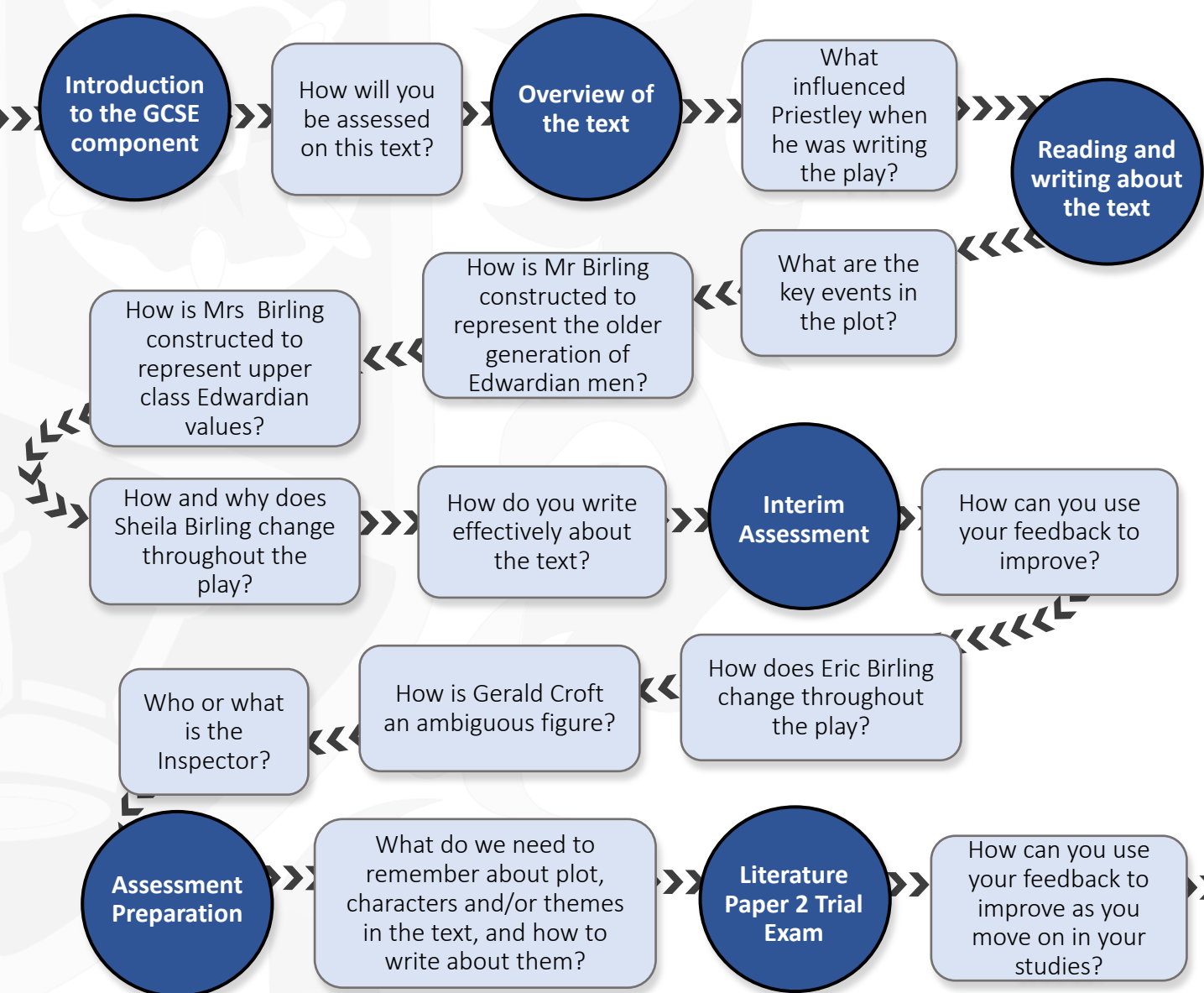

An Inspector Calls

Year 11 Autumn Term

You will begin Year 11 by completing your study of the GCSE set texts for English Literature. Through J.B. Priestley's Edwardian drama, *An Inspector Calls*, you'll evaluate the success of the playwright's message about collective responsibility, and analyse dramatic techniques such as the use of stage directions, props and lighting. By debating the actions of the characters, you will engage with the central themes of the text, forming opinions that will help you to develop your analytical writing.



TUDOR HABITS AND VALUES: The play is a call to **unity**, and you will explore ideas about how much **responsibility** we should take for ourselves and each other in society.

TEXT-SPECIFIC VOCABULARY: social class, status reputation, socialism, capitalism

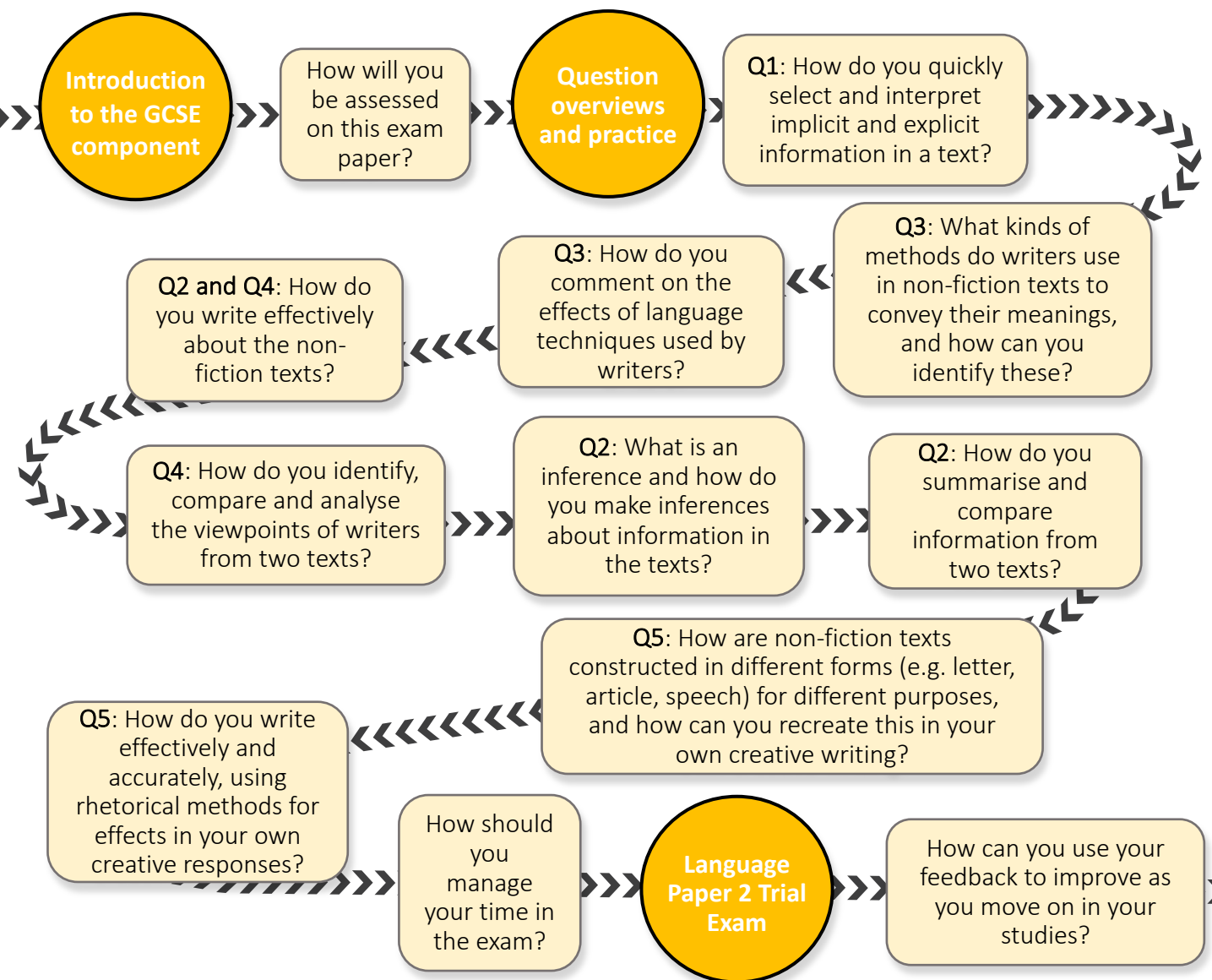
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Writers' Viewpoints and Perspectives

Year 11 Autumn Term

Your study of the English Language GCSE specification will be interleaved with your study of English Literature. In year 11, you'll explore Language Paper 2, where you will engage with a diverse selection of unseen non-fiction texts and compare the writers' use of language to convey their message. You will also have the opportunity to write persuasively, attempting to craft convincing - and technically accurate - articles, letters, essays, speeches and leaflets, as well as completing your Spoken Language endorsement, where you will have the opportunity to hone your public speaking skills.



TUDOR HABITS AND VALUES: You will need to be **open to failure and feedback** as you decode and interpret unseen texts, as well as honing your own writing skills.

TEXT-SPECIFIC VOCABULARY: anecdote, emotive language, direct address, discourse markers

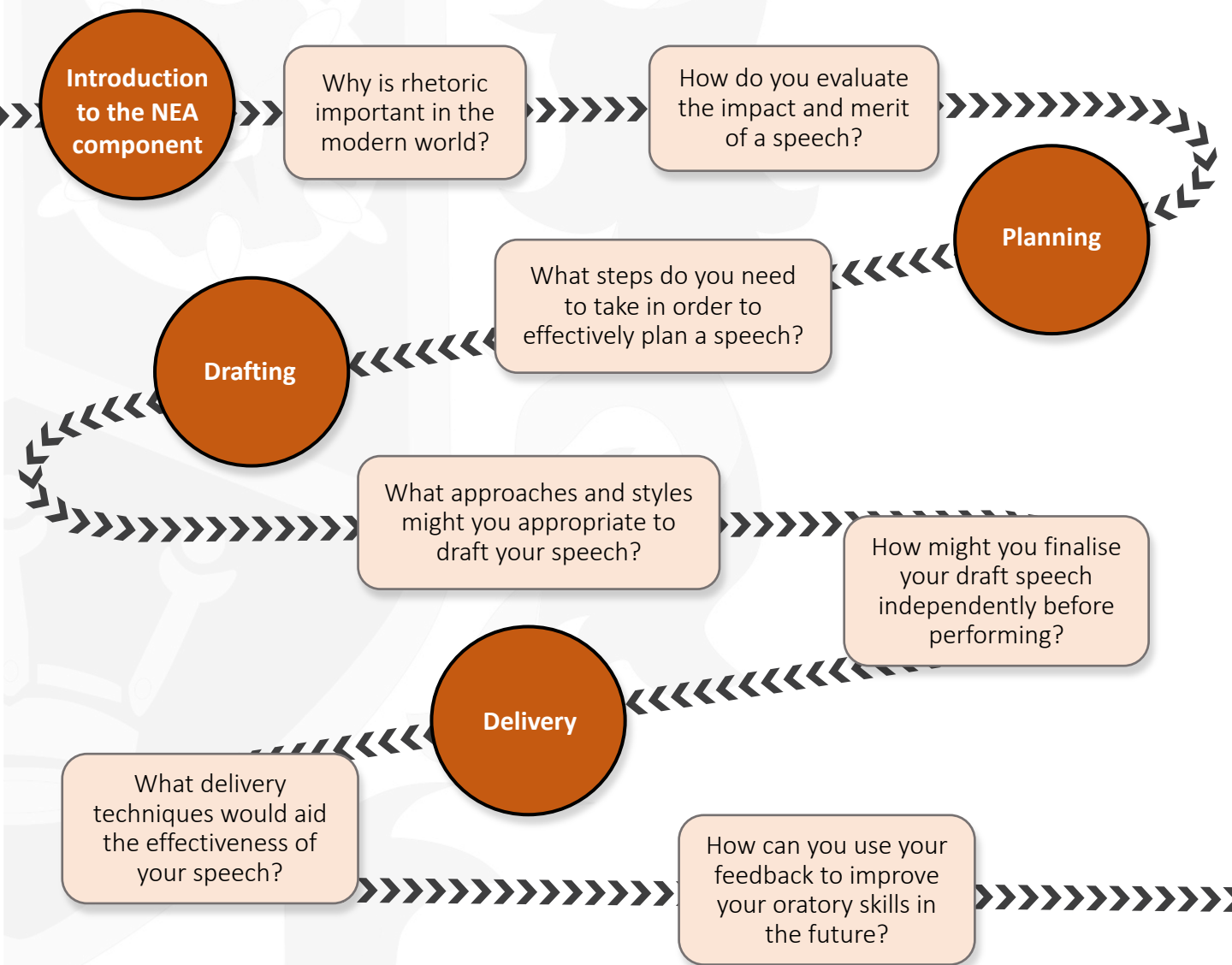
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Spoken Language Endorsement

Year 11 Autumn Term

In Year 11, you will undertake a Spoken Language endorsement. This will now give you the opportunity to hone your oratory and public speaking skills. You will have previously seen during your study of Language Paper 2 how writers are able to craft convincing articles, letters, essays and speeches. By engaging with different strategies for drafting, editing and delivery, you will develop confidence in your ability to convey your ideas and viewpoints to an audience.



TUDOR HABITS AND VALUES: You will need to be **courageous and gritty** as you hone your public speaking skills: it takes great courage to confidently present your opinion and justify why you feel the way you do.

TEXT-SPECIFIC VOCABULARY: anecdote, emotive language, direct address, figurative language
