### Dystopian Fiction

Year 8 Spring Term

Having developed an understanding of the generic conventions of detective fiction, this unit will further your understanding of genre, with a focus on dystopia this time. You will be given an introduction to the genre through studying a range of extracts including some canonical texts. This will develop your appreciation of the cannon whilst exploring how the conventions of the genre have been adapted to present ideas about power and leadership. You will also build on the analytical skills you developed in the previous unit by exploring the metaphorical and allegorical implications of a writer's choice of language and structure. This will prepare you for examining this in greater depth when you study 'The Crucible' by Arthur Miller in Term 3.


