





Basic materials:

YOUR TASK:

- 1 Once you've got an image in mind, you can draw/paint it straight on to the loo roll or you could draw a light / rough guide to want you want to draw before starting.
- 2 Don't forget this is a three-dimensional piece of art, your drawing / painting should stretch at least two thirds of the way around, if not all the way around! Consider your full composition before you start.
- 3 Don't forget to be resourceful....even with a basic biro pen you can apply tone and shade with cross-hatching.



Toilet Roll Torch

- Materials you will need: toilet roll tube, clingfilm, a torch and some shapes. (You can cut out your own shapes and make them more complex, or use found items.)
- YOUR TASK Wrap one end of the toilet roll in cling film then attach your shapes onto the clin film. You will then need to place the torch in the open end of the roll and project your work onto a wall in a dark room and create your own shadow story.

Challenge – create a scene within your toilet roll. Cut our more complex shapes as seen in the images below.







Cardboard Tube Faces

 YOUR TASK – to find an empty toilet roll and fold it in different ways with the aim of creating a face.

Challenge – try to create different facial expressions using multiple rolls.





Object art






Object art - Diego Cusano

- Background information Diego Cusano turns everyday objects into art by drawing around them and changing the way they look. He pays attention to the shape of the original object and draws around it, giving it a new meaning.
- YOUR TASK Draw around the objects below to create work like Diego Cusano.











Shadow characters C



Pareidolia is a psychological phenomenon, where people perceive an object in a different way.

For example identifying shapes in clouds or seeing faces in inanimate objects or abstract patterns.















Tasks:


- See if you can find alternative shapes or faces in everyday objects around your home. Photograph or draw from these.

Background - Surreal can mean to transform an object or to place it somewhere unusual or to create something using your imagination.

YOUR TASK - Change this potato in some way so that it becomes surreal. Make an image that is really unusual and be as creative as you can. You

can use collage or drawing to adapt your potato.




Background info -

• Edward Hopper painted this quiet New York City street in 1930. Look closely at *Early Sunday Morning*. What details do you notice? What details do you think the artist left out? Before making his paintings, Hopper started off with sketches from real life. In his studio he combined different views, often adding things from his own imagination. For Hopper, it was more important to capture a feeling or mood than to represent the world exactly as it looked.

YOUR TASK -


• Look out of a window at home. What do you see? Use a pencil or colored pencils to make a sketch of the view. What details will you include? What will you leave out?


Bathroom Portrait


- Background Roy Lichtenstein made this painting based on a few black-and-white advertisements for bathroom fixtures, such as toilets, tubs, and sinks. Notice the copyright sign on the floor near the toilet. Lichtenstein may have included it from one of the advertisements that he was working with. Look closely at this painting and compare it to your own bathroom. What is similar? What is different? Think about what might be missing from this bathroom painting. Clue: toothpaste, soap, and toilet paper!
- YOUR TASK Bring a piece of paper and a pencil to your bathroom. Find a place to sit and draw the whole bathroom or a detail of it.









Outlined Objects with Limited Colour

- Background information - Jo McGilloway creates outlined still life objects with patches of colour.
- YOUR TASK Create a similar piece. Firstly, draw outlines of multiple objects, layering them over each other like McGilloway does in the image below. Secondly, use paint, pencil crayons or collage to add areas of colour over the top.



Grime Art

- Grime Art involves making images look grimey, dirty and sludgy. Grime Art pieces often look like they are melting and dripping.
- YOUR TASK Alter the image below to make it look like it's dripping. Use a pencil and pencil crayons.







Still Life Item Boxes

- Background information Joseph Cornell is an artist who makes item boxes containing different things collected and arranged together.
- YOUR TASK Produce your own item box below by drawing objects that say something about you and your hobbies. Use pencil and pencil crayons.










Imaginary Landscapes

- Background info Shara Hughes often begins a composition with a mark or a color, then improvises around it. She said: "I dye the canvas a certain color and then it sparks something inside of me to then make another move." This painting is part of a series of imaginary landscapes. In each of these scenes, Hughes includes a painted frame around the edge of the canvas, offering a window into another world.
- YOUR TASK Find a partner and make one drawing each, from your imagination. Use colored pencils or markers. Start by making a quick abstract mark on separate pieces of paper. It could be a wavy line, a rectangle, or a blob. Trade drawings and transform the mark your partner made into a fantasy landscape. If no one is available to help you with this – make 2 drawings on different sheets of paper and complete the second half of the task in a different colour to distinguish the two layers.

Image manipulation - Aldo Tolino

YOUR TASK - Physically manipulate an image in response to Tolinos work. You could cut an image into shapes and arrange them on a page. You could fold them or weave them and you don't have to use a portrait you could use any image as long as you manipulate it in some way.



Tonal Scale Photography

YOUR TASK — to find objects, around your house or garden, that are the same hue and to arrange them in order of tone and photograph them. You can play around with creating different compositions with these objects to create a more interesting image.





Photograph your effort





- Background information For this portrait of art collector Ethel Scull, Andy Warhol took her to a photo booth in Times Square where she
 posed with different gestures and expressions. Then he used photo-silkscreen printing to transfer the photographs onto canvas. Notice how
 Warhol used multiple colors and positioned the prints in different ways to create thirty-six representations of Scull. Can you see the same
 pose more than once? How are they similar or different?#
- YOUR TASK Invite a family member to be your photographer. Choose a place in your home as your photo studio. Think carefully about the background for your portrait. Pose for the camera and experiment with different facial expressions. Choose nine of your favorite pictures and arrange them together on your device or print out your photographs and create a grid. How do your faces look all together?

Challenge – Use photoshop to apply colour filters so that you have a coloured background similar to Warhols work.

Create a miniature gallery in your home

- YOUR TASK to create a tiny art show in your home. Make small drawings and put them in homemade mini frame and display your artwork somewhere like the skirting board of a room or on a wall outside or inside a shoe box.. You can then hold your own exhibition! For your family or your toys! Its up to you who you invite.
- To create frames: you could use the inside of a cereal box packet/black paper/print out an image of a frame



Window silhouettes

Background info on the artist +project:

- While in lockdown in, his home in Madrid, <u>Pejac</u> revived his miniature window figures project, and simultaneously began an inventive global movement, by using nearby landmarks as backdrops for creative marker silhouettes. Since then, the Spanish artist has prompted hundreds of people around the globe to imitate his playful work as they convert structures, fences, and even powerlines into light-hearted and often humorous sites for their outlined figures.
- His idea is an attempt to inspire interaction with urban environments from indoors, while also providing a creative and collaborative public art project. "I always believed that everyone has an artist hidden inside and that if you give them a good reason they are capable of doing wonderful things, and in these strange days of global lockdown, I believe that creativity can be one of the best therapies to fight anxiety and boredom," says the artist.

YOUR TASK:

- → To find a window in your house
- →Draw figure on a piece of paper (as I don't think your parent/guardian would appreciate you graffitiing on their windows!)
- →Then once you have draw the silhouette colour it in wit a black felt tip/pencil
- →cut it out.
- →Then place it on your window ad take a picture of your urban artwork! If you have social media you could post your creation using the hashtag #stayarthomepejac to join the collaborative project.









Geometric Composition

- Background info To create this work, Frank Stella used six colors of paint straight from the can. Notice how the colors are similar to those of a rainbow, from red to violet or violet to red, depending on where you look first. Follow the composition with your eyes. Which colored squares seem to move backward? Which squares seem to move forward?
- YOUR TASK Make a composition using only one geometric shape. It could be a circle, a triangle, a rectangle, or a square. Cover your piece of paper with pencil drawings of your shape. They can be big or small, spaced apart or next to each other. Use up to six different colored paints, pencils or markers to add colour to the shapes and spaces you created.



Fashion cut-outs

YOUR TASK - Create a fashion illustration — male, female, skirts, trousers, it's up to you! Draw a persons face and design the outline of their outfit. Cut out the clothing and hold it up to interesting patterns, colours and objects, these could be man made or natural. Photograph it, to document your creation.



Cereal collaging

Materials:

Head to your recycling bin!
Find any cereal
boxes/Easter egg boxes etc
that you can use for this
task
Scissors
Glue/no glue – you could
just arrange your shapes

YOUR TASK — unpack your boxes so they are flat net shapes. Draw a shape on the inside of the box and cut it out. Then use the outside of the box to cut shapes that you could use to add colour to your design! Take it further by using a pen to add details and textures. Use the theme of insects if you are stuck for inspiration!








Paper Sculpture



Being Inspired by Cheeming Boey

- Background information Cheeming Boey uses disposable cups and black marker pens to create interesting illustrations.
- YOUR TASK Make a piece of art out of a disposable cup. You could draw on it or make a sculpture. You can use more than one to create a series of illustrations or a larger sculpture.
- If you don't have any cups create a drawing on a strip of paper that as the height of a cup in your house and the width of the circumference. Create your illustration and tape it to your chosen cup.





Use your hand and fingers as a canvas









YOUR TASK — is to think of your hand as a canvas/you could draw around your hand onto a piece of paper and apply your ideas to the silhouette. You need to transform your hand into a painting/scene/animal. Once you are happy with what you have produced...Photograph your masterpiece!

Materials you could use: biros/felt tips/paint









- You could make one piece of origami or a piece of art that incorporates lots of different pieces. If you're having trouble you could watch some tutorial videos on YouTube. Choose to make a piece that will challenge you and show off your skills.







Spooky Pokemon

- Background information - Hat Boy is an artist who draws pokemon but makes them look spooky by giving them large eyes, thin limbs and spooky expressions.
- YOUR TASK Try redrawing a Pokemon in a spooky style.









Still Life Remix

- Background info Owh! In San Pao was based on a painting of a coffee pot that Stuart Davis made twenty years earlier. In this painting, he simplified the coffee pot to just a cylinder, and added the words "else," "used to be," and "now." Can you spot the words and the number 6?
- YOUR TASK Grab a few containers from your kitchen. They could be spices, cereals, jams, pastas, or canned food. Arrange them in a still life composition. Notice what stands out to you. Create a drawing, painting or a collage using only geometric shapes such as squares, circles, rectangles, triangles, and cylinders. Add a few words that describe the objects in your picture.

Nature Art

- YOUR TASK Use your allotted daily exercise time to **SAFELY** collect some natural materials. You could do this in your garden or even print out images of natural forms (leaves, twigs, flowers etc) and cut them out. When you get home, lie them out and arrange them to make your own artwork.
- You could create a pattern, animal or scene using the materials you have collected









Land Art

 Background information - Andy Goldsworthy and Richard Long rearrange nature to create artwork. They create patterns they think about the colour of the objects they find and use this when designing their work.

YOUR TASK -

• Collect materials: Use your allotted daily exercise time to **SAFELY** collect some natural materials. You could do this in your garden or even print out images of natural forms (leaves, twigs, flowers etc) and cut them out.

• Layout your design: When you get home, lay out and arrange the objects you collected in the style of **Richard Long or Andy Goldsworthy**.





Positive messages

- Background Raúl de Nieves often transforms everyday materials into something fantastical. He made each panel of this stained-glass mural by hand, with paper, wood, glue, and thin, colored plastic sheets. De Nieves included the words peace, love, truth, justice, harmony, and hope in this installation.
- YOUR TASK Use paper to create a drawing for a window space at home.
 Think about a message you want to share with people passing by and for your family. Think about the hard times people may be facing now and how you could send a positive message to a neighbor passing by to help brighten their day. Think about what shapes, symbols, and figures will you include to communicate your message? When you've finished your drawing, tape it to a window where people inside and outside can see it.

Many-Sided Self-Portrait

- Backgroun All four life-size painted wood female figures in Women and Dog are self-portraits of the artist, Marisol. One figure features her photograph. Two others include plaster casts of the artist's face, and the smaller one has a drawing of her as a child. Marisol also included a real purse, a hair bow, and a taxidermy dog's head in this sculpture.
- YOUR TASK Think about the things that make up who you are, including the things you love, the activities you enjoy, and the special qualities of your personality. Find an empty cardboard box and some collage materials such as old magazines or colored paper. On each side of your box, draw and collage one part of your personality.



- Background info -Alexander Calder made this work after visiting the Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey Circus at Madison Square Garden in 1925. He recycled everyday objects such as bottle caps, corks, and buttons to create his own "big top" stars. When he traveled, Calder carried his circus in suitcases and performed it for friends in Europe and America. Calder acted out a story with his figures, while his audience sat on bleachers and ate peanuts as if they were at a real circus!
- YOUR TASK Head to your kitchen with a grownup.
 Find five small objects.
 Use items such as rubber bands, twist ties, or tape to combine these objects and create your own circus character. Then, perform a circus show for your family.

DIY Painting

For this task we want you to paint with tea or coffee. Don't have a paintbrush? Try using something different too – you could draw with a twig or a feather. See the other examples for making different brushes below.


TASK:

Make either a cup of tea or coffee. Do not put milk or sugar in though! You want to make it strong, so if making tea leave the tea bag in the cup. Once it is cold, you are ready to paint with it.

- Create a page of different marks using different materials. Write what you used to make the marks underneath each mark.
- Once you are happy with the different marks that you can make, on a new piece of paper, lightly with a pencil draw a portrait. This could be yourself or someone in your house.
- 3. Now use your 'brushes' to paint your portrait.

 Try to get light and dark areas by adjusting the dilution of your mixture.
- Now write about your work. Answer the following questions using sentences.
- What have you produced?
- Has the technique been successfully? Why?
- How could I be further improved or developed?










Photography Challenge – Laundry Landscape











Tea & Coffee Stains

YOUR TASK - Splash some tea or coffee on a page or leave some cup rings behind. When they dry, see what shapes they make and work into them with pen. They could become tiny characters, doodles or full works of art.

Creating with Shadows

YOUR TASK – find some natural forms (leaves flowers, branches etc) sit outside and place your paper underneath them so that the sun creates a shadow on your page. Trace around the shadow and apply colour to the shapes you have drawn. You or use a torch to create more intense shadows.

Challenge – layer multiple shadows to create a more complex design and follow the link below to see how you could creatively add colour using materials you may have access to while we are in lockdown.



- Try and ensure you draw the detail and shade as accurately as possible


Facial expressions










Greg Guillemin


Monster Objects








Narrative and Sequence

Narrative art is <u>art</u> that tells a <u>story</u>, either as a moment in an ongoing story or as a sequence of events unfolding over time. Some of the earliest evidence of human art suggests that people told stories with pictures






Using Inanimate Objects to Tell Stories

- Information Many artists use altered objects to tell stories.
 Terry Border changes objects by adding legs and arms and making small scenes with them. These can often be amusing and thought-provoking.
- YOUR TASK Alter objects (you may add googly-eyes or arms and legs made of wire) and produce a small scene(s). You could take a photograph of your objects and then add the leg/arm/face details. You could make a background and props too!
- You could even arrange images of objects in photoshop or your could hand draw your scene.







Unfolding Adventures

- Background info The painting on the left has a secret story behind it. The picture that you see here is just one of five parts that make up the whole artwork. Laura Owens hid the other four parts behind the canvas! If you could look at the back, you would find three more paintings and a little book, all related to the image that you see in front of you. Look closely at this work. What can you find that is fun? What can you see that might be scary?
- YOUR TASK Make an artwork with adventures that unfold! Find four or five pieces of paper. Cut out a shape on each page. The shapes could be different or the same, but make sure they are in different places on each page. Use a stapler, binder clips, or tape to attach your sheets of paper together along one edge.
- Next, choose a favorite character from a book, cartoon, or television show. Think of some adventures that your character might experience. Start drawing a scene on the first page. Reveal a clue about the next moment (on the next page) through the shaped opening in the paper! Continue until your artwork is complete.

On the right, is another example of Laura Owens work. Where she uses layers and story in her work. You could place your layers so that they line up with the text written on them like she has in this piece.
