
French Revolution and the rule of Napoleon 1774–1815

Autumn Term

You will develop your knowledge of the **causes** of Napoleon's downfall, analysing the **relative importance** of the **contributing factors.** You will also evaluate the extent to which Napoleon was **responsible** for his **own downfall**, through **unforced errors** and **overstretching** of his resources.

Alongside this, you will **continue to write your NEA** on the aspect of the French Revolution of your choice, with your **first two drafts due** during this term.

Through these two aspects of your course, you will continue to **develop your understanding** of the different **skills** and **processes** required to be a historian. There's also excellent links to a career in **STEM research** or **law**, due to the **attention to detail** and **nuance of argument** necessary in your work.



PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT: You will continue to investigate what it means to be a **democratic citizen** and debate **societal issues.** However, crucially here, discussion will also be formed around the impact of being willing to step up and **participate** to help to **shape the world**, as a link to the **coalition powers** and their **united front** against **Napoleon**.
